Did you know that?

The San Marcos Unified School District provides an instructional program tailored to meet the diverse needs of English learners (ELs). The instructional program ensures access to a full curriculum with scaffolds and support for students at different levels of English language proficiency. The ultimate goal is for ELs to meet academic performance criteria, while simultaneously reaching full proficiency in English.

In addition, the instructional option ensures that ELs with disabilities have an equal opportunity to participate in a program consistent with their Individualized Education Plan (IEP). The English learner program also allows for equal access for gifted and talented students, not excluding ELs based solely on their English proficiency levels.

The intent for this Parent Brochure is to inform parents about the English learner program for English learners. If you still have questions about instructional programs, please speak with your child's teacher, the school principal, or the Director of Special Programs.

Stay informed throughout the school year about important EL resources and events by visiting our district website and attending your school's English Language Advisory Committee (ELAC) and Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) meetings.

What does Reclassification Mean?

Reclassification is the process by which an English learner has acquired sufficient proficiency in English to succeed academically. Students are expected to reach minimum yearly benchmarks in English Language Arts and English Language Development so they may reclassify within five full years of initial identification as an English Learner. Students in Kindergarten are eligible for reclassification at the end of Kindergarten. English Learners in our district must meet all the following criteria at the same time for reclassification:

To complete the reclassification process, a Notification of Reclassification Letter is signed by the parent and placed in the student's cum.

Instructional Program

Structured English Immersion (SEI)

What is it?

Instructional program taught in English for students beginning to learn English.

How does this program help my child?

Students acquire English language skills with appropriate support while learning standards-based content.

What are the instructional components?

Students learn all academic subjects in English.

Teachers use special strategies to teach academic subjects to English learners.

Students receive at least 30 minutes daily of English Language Development (ELD) instruction.



English learners who are reclassified as proficient in English by the end of fifth grade, perform as well or better academically than native speakers and they continue to do so through middle and high school.
